Bonn: an international city

onn is a international city with a diverse mix of nationalities, cultures and religions.

On 29th November 1949 the small town of Bonn was elected the capital city of the Federal Republic of Germany. In the following decades the federal district influenced the character of the city.

The city of Germanic and Roman origin on the Rhine looks back on a history of more than 2000 years which makes it one of the oldest cities in Germany.

With a population of over 300,000 Bonn is one of the 20 largest cities in Germany.

Bonn is a historical, cultural and political city. The foundation stone for Bonn's expansion as the German United Nations city was laid on 20th June 1996.

Today Bonn is the home to 18 United Nations organisations.

General Information

ounded in 1963 I.B.I.S., formerly the British Embassy Preparatory School (BEPS), has long served both the local and international communities in Bonn. We aim to promote quality education and our philosophy of education is to give children an education which develops the whole child – academically, socially, morally, emotionally and physically in an atmosphere of honesty, tolerance and respect for others and themselves.

The school is registered as a non-profit making association (eingetragener Verein) and has a Support Association (Förderverein) to deal with financial aspects of the school.

I.B.I.S. is also an "anerkannte Ersatzschule" which means it has been inspected and is accredited by the German authorities.

The school is also inspected regularly by the Independent Schools Inspectorate which is the main English group of inspectors for independent schools. The next school visit from the Council of British International Schools (COBIS) is scheduled in the near future.

The School Association

I.B.I.S. is registered in Germany as a non-profit making association,"eingetragener Verein (e.V.)".

The Association is managed by a Board of up to eleven electable governors who are responsible for helping to shape school policy and financially managing the school.

Location and Facilities

he school is purpose-built in pleasant, rural surroundings on the Heiderhof, a quiet residential area of Bonn-Bad Godesberg, within easy reach of both the city of Bonn and the Rhine. By car, the school is only 5 minutes from the town centre of Bad Godesberg and 15 minutes from the centre of Bonn. The school is also very close to the excellent public bus service with the regular 610 and 611 buses stopping very near to the school. These buses connect with the U-Bahn (Underground) at the Stadthalle or Rheinallee and Bad Godesberg railway station.

Every class has its own classroom. In addition we have:

- A school hall used for whole school assemblies, drama, concerts and lunches
- Extra rooms for English as an Additional Language (EAL), Learning Development and German
- A well resourced music room
- A well equipped kitchen

- A well stocked library with over 3000 books and digital media
- Administrative offices
- Smaller classrooms for group learning
- An interactive whiteboard in each classroom
- A fully equipped sports hall situated one minute's walk from the school and shared with our neighbouring German primary school
- A uniform shop

We have a large hard-surfaced playground, a soft-fall sports area as well as shaded play areas. These provide splendid recreational facilities and are also used for outdoor sports. We have various climbing frames, including a large wooden multi-game construction generously donated by the VIP's (Volunteer I.B.I.S. parents). The school also has access to both a local sports ground and tennis courts, 5 minutes away.



Entry Procedure

Children are welcome at I.B.I.S. between the ages of 3 and 13.

We encourage families to visit and be shown the school by the Headteacher. The ages of children in any one class are measured according to the academic year from 1st September. On entry to the school, children may have a basic assessment or test to establish their levels in certain skills.

Placement Procedure

The basic criterion for class placement is age. Our cut-off date is September 1st of the academic year. The school reserves the right to place each child in the class year group deemed to be the most appropriate and beneficial. Children coming from a different system are placed with their chronological peers in the appropriate year level.

Please note that the numbering of classes in I.B.I.S. may be different from the system used by other countries. The following table indicates American and German system equivalents.

Early Years Kindergarten & Reception (3-5 years old)

here is a purpose-built **Early Years** unit with its own secure playground. In a happy and caring atmosphere, children socialise with their peers, developing selfassurance and acceptance of general group rules. Under careful and attentive supervision, by a qualified teacher and teaching and learning assistants, the **Early Years** provides a wide range of activities to support, promote and develop children's learning.

Activities and resources are carefully planned to allow for both adult and child-initiated, play-centred learning experiences both inside and outside. The seven areas of learning are split between prime and specific areas.

The prime areas of learning are:

- Communication and Language
- Physical Development
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development

The specific areas of learning are:

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

We aim to stimulate our children's social and creative skills and encourage a sense of cooperation and independence. Children are encouraged to express themselves creatively at their individual levels, while building up self-confidence.

Parents have a choice for children to attend the **Kindergarten** on a half-day (08:40-12:00) or full-day (08:40-15:00) basis. Children are welcome as soon as they have reached their third birthday and are toilet-trained as far as possible.

Children move on to Year 1 class after the summer holidays, provided they are 5 years old by **1st September**.

Year One – Year Eight 5-13 years old

he school operates an internationalised programme based on the English National Curriculum, a curriculum used in a large number of schools throughout the

world. The language of teaching is English. The maximum class size is 22 pupils. Subjects covered include:



Extra-curricular Activities

Communication between school and home

t I.B.I.S., we believe that effective communication between home and school is vital.

At the start of the new school year, parents are invited to a meeting with their child's teacher so that the class curriculum programme for the year can be explained and parents' questions can be answered. Parent-teacher meetings and interviews are held throughout the year. Written reports are sent to parents twice a year, after which parents are invited to discuss their child's progress with the teachers. By appointment, parents are also welcome to speak with the teachers at other times and after school.

Homework is seen as an integral element of the communication and partnership between home and school. We also believe that homework complements and reinforces the activities carried out during the school day.

> Each class is taught by a fully qualified teacher supported by teaching and

learning assistant in certain areas. German, French, Spanish, Science and Music are taught by specialist teachers. Regular in-service training keeps teachers up to date with the latest developments in education.

Since 2001 I.B.I.S. has been approved by the German authorities as a "staatlich anerkannte Ersatzschule der Primarstufe". This means that we have incorporated the requirements of the normal German "Grundschule" (primary school) programme within our tried and tested teaching programme. Pupils are divided into groups for German according to their experience with the language. For those who wish, transfer to and from German schools is straightforward.

Pupils requiring help with their English (EAL support) are assessed by our specialist teacher and are taught in small groups. The aim is to enable children to integrate quickly into normal classroom activities. Learning Development Support is also available to children who need reinforcement or extension in specific areas of the curriculum.

The school is non-denominational, however, we encourage tolerance of world religions and actively promote the ideal of international understanding. The school also presents two awards from the Council of British International Schools for academic excellence and various other subject awards instigated by previous Boards,

teachers and parents.



What kind of communication can we expect between school and home?

s professional educators we feel strongly that to maximise learning for our students, effective and open communication with parents is essential.

We maintain close communication with parents in the following ways:

We utilise email to communicate with the whole I.B.I.S. parent community, or with specific groups within it.

We aim to keep our emails relevant, informative and to a minimum.

I.B.I.S. Bulletin

The I.B.I.S. bulletin is our main way of communicating with the whole school and offers an extensive library of resources for you as a parent.

This also includes the messages from the Headteacher, published regularly. It is a one-stop-shop to keep up to date with important messages.

75 % of the parents are Expatriates (Expats), specialists and executives for international organisation & companies, who usually stay in Bonn between 1-5 years. 25% of I.B.I.S. students are German-speaking children whose parents live in Bonn.



Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

How do we prepare pupils for secondary school after Years 5, 6 and 7/8?

There are a variety of options open to families post-I.B.I.S. Gymnasien and international schools (such as BIS and St. George's locally) are most common. Our school tailors approaches for both, including native standard German lessons and specialist subject preparation (German maths and social studies for example). We also maintain close contacts with possible destinations, helping to smooth the process between schools.

Is School uniform obligatory after Kindergarten?

School uniform is compulsory, and we are happy to explain why: a school uniform fosters a strong sense of community and shared purpose among our students, while ensuring that wearing the, right' or, wrong' clothes and brands never becomes an issue.

Where do the students eat lunch, who do we get it from and how much does it cost?

The children eat lunch in our large and fully equipped Bolik Hall, which now complies with COVID-19 hygiene rules. Lunch can be brought from home, or from our long-term provider: Lehmanns.

What kind of Extra-curricular activities do you offer?

In the normal school year, we offer a large range of extra-curricular activities, both during and after school. For example, before the pandemic we offered over 30 different activities, including sport, academic support, languages, music and art based clubs. Some activities have been created to support core subject work, but more often than not they focus on interests not necessarily covered in the curriculum.

How exactly do German lessons look at I.B.I.S. & from which year on do we start teaching German?

Non-native students start receiving German instruction from Reception onwards, native standard German speakers from Year One. These two groups continue to receive tailored German lessons (Deutsch als Fremdsprache and Deutsch als Muttersprache respectively) throughout their I.B.I.S. schooling. As an Ersatzschule, we have the freedom to follow our own timetable, but our 'outcomes' and quality of *German* education need to be the same as those offered by German schools (our German classes follow the NRW curriculum). The aim is to facilitate the path for our students who do go onto study in the German system, and to encourage bi-linguialism and an internationalist outlook for those who do not.

To which secondary schools do your students go after I.B.I.S.?

Our students really can and do go anywhere after I.B.I.S., but there are common destinations: 60% of I.B.I.S. leavers enter the German system (with the vast majority of those going to Gymnasium), while the rest is split between students returning with their families to their home country or going to another international school. Of those who go to a local international school, the majority go to BIS. All of our processes, including our education, grading and overall outlook, are designed to support our families as they make that next step.

What is the Early Years Curriculum?

We follow the Early years Foundation Stage (part of the UK National Curriculum), which sets standards for the learning, development and care of children up until they are 5 years old.

The areas of learning are:

- communication and language
- physical development
- personal, social and emotional development
- literacy
- mathematics
- understanding the world
- expressive arts and design

As opposed to the German system, there is more structure and students are learning rather than just playing. Having said that, much of the learning is *through* games and play, and EY at I.B.I.S. is a happy, social and fun environment.

Are the students tested and graded with tests as in the German system?

The German system has an emphasis on tests.

Here, while testing is an important part of what we do, we consider progress 'in the whole', taking into consideration classroom work and participation, oral feedback, work as individuals and in groups – as well as tests. We don't teach our students to pass tests, rather we consider them one piece of evidence with regards to progress overall.

However, we do make sure that our grades and reports are delivered in a way that works seamlessly with the Germany system. This includes reports being summarised and translated into German and an average grade created for years 4 and 5. All of which is to say our outcomes are compatible with the German system as well as all other likely destinations.

Who will help us if we as a family do not understand English very well?

A majority of staff members speak German as well as English, and are ready to help families and students. For students in particular, we are aware that being dropped into a new language environment can be stressful, so we go out of our way to make that process as easy-going as possible.

With our international environment (there are also lots of French and Spanish speakers), we are very used to helping students and families orientate quickly, regardless of their background.

It's a great joy to see our students leave our school, normally having gained at least one new language, and to see the huge benefit play out again and again. Students may not speak much English when they join, they will when they leave!

Is there the possibility, if students need tutoring in certain subjects, to get support from professionals?

The expectation is that the students will be able to meet standards across subjects within the day, without the need for extra-tutoring (as is common in German schools, where the normal school day is much shorter and 'Nachhilfe' is expected).

Having said that, we do offer support in some key areas (English as an additional language for instance), and, where it is possible, in other subjects. There are also some extra-curricular clubs (COVID-19 disturbance notwithstanding) that have been designed to support school subjects (German homework help for instance).

How much do members of the financial support association (Förderverein) contribute?


